

Merle Hamilton - born in March 1925, Merle died on 14th February 2024, just short of her 99th birthday. Her funeral was at Christ Church on 26th




February. A dedicated member of the congregation, Merle was a



Fr Lankírí's Easter message

At the conclusion of the creation, "God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day" (Genesis 1:31). All that God declared good, included humankind as part of the created order. All went well at the Garden of Eden until the devil, represented by the serpent, showed up and turned human beings against God. The deception from the serpent broke God's heart so much that God felt as the author of Genesis



has recorded it: "-And the LORD was sorry that he had made humankind on the earth, and it grieved him to his heart. So the LORD said, I will blot out from the earth the human beings I have created — people together with animals and creeping things and birds of the air, for I am sorry that I have made them." (Genesis 6:6-7).

But all this sad feeling did not change the love God has for humanity. And God thought ...maybe if I become like them, if I speak their language and share in their culture they will turn away from their evil ways and return to me. "And the word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). Then Jesus was born. And St Paul echoed the words of St John when he said "Who, being in the form of God, did not consider it robbery to be equal with God, but made himself of no reputation, taking the form of a servant, and coming in the likeness of humanity" (Philippians 2:6,7).

With this background in mind we can then argue that human beings, as part of God's creation, are very close to God's heart and that God would stop at nothing to win us back to Him. To demonstrate this deep love God has for us, God did what nobody can ever do dying to save us. St John in his Gospel affirms this "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13). This is demonstrated by Jesus dying on the cross and rising again to have all of us saved and reconciled with God, and almost taking things back to where they were at the creation when those beautiful words were uttered: "God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good." Differently put, Easter reminds us of the new beginnings, new life, starting afresh by God to demonstrate the love God has for us.

As we approach Easter and journeying through this Season of Lent, the beautiful relations we have amongst our families, churches, work place, are going to collapse or be broken. This is all due to the evil that we see at the Garden of Eden and that deceived Adam and Eve and turned them against God, and continues to bring the same divisions between family members, between lovers, between worshippers, between fellow colleagues, between Denominations etc. And since "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that § everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life"(In 3:16), it is incumbent upon each and every one of us to maintain healthy relations with one another: family, friend, husband, wife, colleague, parents and children, nation with nation. May the spirit of Easter compel us to reconcile one with another, and nation with nation.

May Jesus the Christ die with our brokenness on Good Friday and rise with our new intentions & hopes to rebuild our relations with one another, nation with nation, humanity with God. I wish you all a fulfilling and spiritually safe Lenten Season with the joys of the The Rev. Lankiri Thaba, Vicar resurrected Lord on Easter Sunday.



God in the Sciences

What will March bring? Mental health ideas for uncertain times

We may all have rather mixed feelings on reaching March this year. On the one hand, it is lovely to see the onset of another season, but the wars in Ukraine and Israel-Gaza grind on, as does the cost-of-living crisis. We may need to find new ways to keep going, so here are some suggestions that draw on both science and Christian theology.

Getting outside

Time outdoors in a natural environment is very good for you – and you can't argue with the happy hormones produced by exercise. Attending to the details of nature can also inspire awe, which has been linked to positive mood, and increased life satisfaction. Enjoying Creation can also help us connect with God.

Looking outside

If you are truly stuck indoors, try putting bird feeders outside your window so creation comes to you. This is also an act of kindness (see below)!

Lament and praise

The Psalms are a rich resource to help us express both our grief and our thanks to God. Try reading one or two each day.

lournaling

Keep a journal of thoughts, experiences or practices you have engaged with during the day. Constructing a personal narrative or story is now recognised as a very powerful psychological and spiritual tool for building resilience. It is also a vital learning tool that we can go back to when tough times return in the future.

Acts of kindness

Helping or encouraging someone else is obviously a good thing to do in itself, but it also has a very positive effect on the giver - spiritually, mentally, emotionally, and even physically. Whichever way you look at it, finding new ways to show kindness to others can be a very effective way to help ourselves feel better too.


Gratitude

Gratitude is another natural drug – in a sense – that can help us feel better. Try keeping a grateful diary, adding a few things each day.

• Laugh, sing, make music, dance

All of these activities are deeply rooted in our physical and mental makeup. You may have forgotten how great they feel, especially in times of sadness, but we can learn from children who do them very naturally.

I hope these ideas may help bring us closer to God, each other, and His creation.


Fundraising Update

MEALS PROGRAM NEWS

Thank you to all who contributed to the December 'Reverse Advent Calendar' appeal. The items donated were a great help and left the shelves quickly, as record numbers were registered throughout the holiday period. This was evident in the January spend of \$872 by the Program, where usually it is around \$600. (This was in addition to the monthly support from the St John of God Foundation that matches the normal spend).

It was a great pleasure to receive support for the first time from staff at Community Care Chemist at Bellarine Village who chose to donate to us instead of exchanging Christmas

gifts. Once again Bernard Shiu and his team provided a delicious Christmas lunch, for over 100 guests this year. So many people work before, during and after this annual event to make it such a success. We thank them one and all.

The Rotary Club of Bayside continue to support us by providing gift bags to be distributed in the week prior to Christmas, and this is always so well received by our guests. More recently we have received the bounty from St John's Lutheran Church Harvest Festival which included many items to support the Food Cupboard, and \$475 in cash. Their support for the Meals Program goes back many years. We continue to receive support from several Rotary and Lions Clubs and Kiwanis; daily support from Brumbys East Geelong helps provide sliced bread for breakfasts; Rolling Pin and Routleys continue to supply a generous amount of baked goods.

Geelong Food Relief delivers every Wednesday and have listened to our requests about the provision of eggs, bacon and cheese. We were delighted to be able to provide a letter of support to be included in their recent application for a grant from Geelong Community Foundation, and wish them well, as we benefit greatly from their assistance.

The numbers of those attending the Meals Program services have increased dramatically over recent months. This, sadly, seems a reflection of the times we are in, and means we have new faces appearing all the time, but the overall need of food security is being met by our tireless volunteers to whom we express our heartfelt thanks. CLAIMED AND CALLED - LETTING GOD HELP US

WITH DECISION MAKING

Source/Reference - Youtube. Ascension Presents: Four Helpful Rules for Discernment and Youtube Ascension Presents: The Only Kind of Life Worth Living - both presented by Father Mike Schmitz

We have just been through the beginning of the church and calendar new year. This can be a time of renewal, perspective taking and fresh starts.... although often our good intentions can fade as we start to journey through January and get back into things as the work/school years get underway in February.

Recently I came across some helpful guidance on Youtube from Fr Mike Schmitz of Ascension Presents. There are actually two versions of this talk - 4 Helpful Rules for Discernment - if you prefer the shorter version at approximately six minutes, or The Only Kind of Life Worth Living (Claimed and Called) which comes in around 24 minutes.

Essentially Fr Mike proposes that to live a fulfilling life we need to remember that God has both a claim on our life and a call on our life. So God has a care and loving interest in us and a plan or calling for us to live by. However for many of us it can be difficult to discern what it is that God wants us to do, so what to do? For the majority of us the call is not always obvious, and can lead to feelings that we are not doing what God wants us to do or be.

It is helpful to remember that God is always with us and that he gives us the gift of free will, and it is ok for us to use our intellect and choice to guide our decision making. There is no perfect plan and plans are made to be adjusted, and we need to step out in faith with God and allow Him to meet us where we are and to equip us with what we need at the time. We see this time and again in the Bible - with Moses, Jonah, Mary and Peter all being examples of people being equipped for tasks that they were not necessarily expecting or having a natural aptitude for.

At times when we feel God's path for us may be unclear it can be good to ask ourselves four key questions -

- ls this a good door? In answering this question we are guided by our values and ethics, though some things are a bit more distinct. For example, it is largely irrefutable that it is not a good idea to steal money from your workplace! In a similar vein it is unlikely to be a good idea to drink and drive. We need to look at this question from the perspective of is it a good possibility or at least a neutral one? We don't want to go through any bad doors.
- Is this an open door? This one is quite straightforward, although it can also be a time waster in second guessing or being unrealistic about our possibilities. According to Fr Mike the NBA (National Basketball Association) is a closed door and not an option for him! Similarly my aspirations to be the next Nadia Comaneci and win an Olympic gold for gymnastics or alternatively to have a successful singing career, are closed doors for me. Whilst there are some who may say if you can dream it you can do it, certain options are clearly either not ordained or not realistic for us, and we should not spend too much time on them, and rather focus on more realistic possibilities.
- \diamond **Is this a wise door?** Having ascertained that the door is good, and open, we need to discern if this is a wise door and this is where we need to (continued p.8) PAGE 7

(from p.7) activate our God-given gifts of free will, intellect and choice. We may need to do more analysis here, exploring the pros/cons of the choice before us. For example, knowing what I know about myself will this decision enhance or harm me? What will be my strengths and struggles in this decision?

Do I want to go through this door? Finally we need to consider - do I actually want to do this task/make this decision? Do I have what's needed for this choice? An example here might be a course of study; it may be a good option to study medicine, you may be able to qualify for the course and it may suit your intellect, but if you do not want to deal with sick patients each day then this may not be a viable decision.

Perhaps next time you are facing a decision or choice, remember God allows us the freedom to decide things for ourselves and to make decisions of our own. Then try these four doors to help you with the process. Remember too there is no perfect plan; God is always with us and meets us where we are, and equips us with what we need through knowing and loving us.

On why pews SHOULD be uncomfortable

My dear Nephew Darren,

Visits from your parishioners to our church are always welcome. But I did not expect them to return to you complaining because our pews are uncomfortable.

Pews are <u>meant</u> to be uncomfortable. The unshakeable belief of our congregation is that the more uncomfortable the pew, the holier the worship must be. By the same token, an 8am Service is more fervent than one at 10am, since it is much more socially inconvenient. If you add on enduring freezing temperatures and damp in winter, then sainthood clearly beckons. Your people may be used to lolling in upholstered chairs in tropical temperatures, but I am sure such comfort places their souls in grave peril.

Our pews were built many, many years ago, when people were several inches shorter and many pounds lighter, and so could accommodate themselves on them perfectly adequately. The fact that a twenty-first century body is in constant danger of sliding off the seat and requires knees to be folded somewhere near the ears at least helps to keep minds focussed - apart from Colonel Wainwright, who still manages to sleep peacefully throughout the service every Sunday. I could point out that your chairs make kneeling almost impossible although I suspect that posture is not encouraged in your church, as people would then be unable to read the words on your overhead projector or wave their arms about quite as easily during the hymns. While the majority of our congregation find the Anglican crouch perfectly adequate, you can see those who flop to their knees on hearing "let us pray" from the clouds of dust sent up from suddenly compressed hassocks, which were purchased to commemorate Queen Victoria's Accession.

I may also point out that our box pews are very useful for modern times. Once a family is seated, with the door firmly shut, then any toddler is penned in and unable to use the aisles as a racing circuit. Medieval carpenters were clearly forward-thinking people. Admittedly, box pew doors do tend to stick, and few manage to look dignified while they wait for step ladders to (cont. p.12) PAGE 11
